Coordinated by the Youth of the Parish Juliana Baranowski organized the effort and dropped of a check for \$838.04 We will need to add this item to the end of your agenda to Accept the money

Councilor Edes said that the tragedy in Dallas recently really hits home in the law enforcement community. He has been asked by the State Police to go to Dallas to attend the funerals of 2 or 3 of the officers killed. He has been talking with Chief Rumsey about what we can do to represent Cumberland at the funerals. He will be placing a Cumberland Police patch on the grave of each of the Dallas Police Officers that were killed. Chief Rumsey shared with him that the community has reached out to the Cumberland Police Department with kind words and baked goods to show their support and appreciation for our police department.

IV. PUBLIC DISCUSSION

Brad Hilton of Blanchard Road said that at the last meeting there was no effort by the Council to decrease the mil rate, but instead the expenditures were expanded. The end of year surplus was approximately \$700,000. Instead of using this to reduce taxes, the Council decided to put it back into the budget. This makes him angry. There are a lot of residents who cannot make ends meet and they will be forced to cut back on how they live. He feels that the Council is not representing the Town well.

Councilor Gruber responded that instead of having the surplus, items could have been added into the budget and funded that way, which would have increased the mil rate more. The Council chose not to do that and he takes exception to Mr. Hilton's remarks as Chairman of the Finance Committee.

Curtis Ingraham of 55 Greely Road read the following remarks in regard to fireworks:

I volunteer for our fire/rescue department. I'm here to speak on the Fireworks Ordinance.

I am here on my own accord and may or may not be representing any of the town management's nor public safety membership opinions.

I've provided a map of neighboring towns showing regulation of fireworks.

My Position Up Front

I enjoy seeing fireworks put on by the professionals in Portland, L.L. Bean, the Seadog's, Yarmouth Clam Festival, and others. The reflections when over water are spectacular and the water provides an excellent margin of safety. I am not a proponent of allowing consumer based pyrotechnics in the Town Of Cumberland.

This Year's Conditions and Specific Localized Concerns

The weather is dry along the coast but was not a bad inland so the Fire Danger Class Day did not effectively address very localized conditions.

In the corner of Cumberland where we live, there are no Portland Water District hydrants, no water tower feeds, no dry hydrants, and no ponds nor lakes. I-295 and Route 1 effectively eliminate drawing water from the ocean. A fire water shuttle system would have to be established. These take a long time to set-up.

Fire/EMS personnel are generally out and about on July 4^{th} and not readily available to respond to a situation. They also may already be at a call somewhere else. This was the case this July 4^{th} .

Because of mutual aid to neighboring towns that have no ordinance or that allow restricted use, Cumberland personnel may be called to their events. This currently includes Westbrook, Gorham, Windham, Pownal, and Gray.

Other Observations

The local "kept" animals (sheep, horses, cows, etc.) do not seem to enjoy the noise. I know I do not.

The wildlife retreat to their shelters.

We have a few "locals" who launch fireworks weeks before the allowed times. It's startling and initially makes one wonder if it's firearms. Calling 911 and all the folks on PD really don't want to

chase these "non-emergency" calls and in fact it may be illegal to 911 because it's not an emergency and could be a misuse of 911. The majority of people calling would not understand this. A Cumberland resident who called may have got caught up in this one on July 4th.

Fireworks and discharge of firearms can sound the same to those unfamiliar with either.

The whole thing flies in the face of a presumed covenant of "quiet enjoyment". Quiet enjoyment is legally defined as a right to the undisturbed use and enjoyment of real property by a tenant or landowner.

Lastly, most home-owner's policies do not cover losses due to the illegal use of fireworks. Many policies do not cover losses due to the legal use of fireworks. One could be in for some real financial hardship if they get caught up in this one.

Real Incidents

I won't rehash the Crossing Brook or West End Brush fire calls in the evening of July 4th. Suffice to say:

Everyone was very fortunate that nobody was hurt.

Property damage was limited.


The residents, their visitors, and public safety personnel got to go home to their families.

20+ public safety personnel gave up their prime holiday time to mitigate two calls at once.

Imagine this happening with errant fireworks on my end of town, undiscovered, us not home, and limited access to water supply. It would have been a total loss.

In Closing

I recommend we repeal the ordinance and not further invite incidents that have now fired warning shots at us.



V. <u>LEGISLATION AND POLICY</u>

16 – 091 Swearing in of Councilor Edes.

Deputy Town Clerk, Eliza Porter administered the oath of office to Councilor Edes.

16 – 092 To hold a Public Hearing to authorize the Town Manager to amend TIF District #1 to allow a Credit Enhancement Agreement for FMC Development, LLC d/b/a the Memory Care Facility.

Town Manager Shane explained that this item has been before the Council at least three times and before the Finance Committee six times. This was a request from the Memory Care Facility 6 or 7 months ago for their proposed facility on Route One. This lot is the last lot in our Route One North TIF District. When we originally amended the TIF District, approximately 10 years ago, there were 3 lots left. At that time, Norton Financial was going to purchase 2 lots, and Planet Dog was going to purchase the 3rd. The Credit Enhancement Agreement was written specific to those businesses. Planet Dog did not end up expanding their business and did not purchase the 3rd lot. The Credit Enhancement Agreement still lists Planet Dog in it. It simply has to be amended to list the Memory Care Facility (FMC Development, LLC).

Chairman Turner opened the Public Hearing.

Dr. John Campbell of West Cumberland, a Geriatric Psychiatrist, said that he hopes that this facility will accept Medicaid payments and not only allow wealthy patients. He has learned that the system is very inequitable when it comes to a patient's ability to pay privately as opposed to needing Medicaid to pay. He treats many patients who are residents of Cumberland and he has many patients who are stuck in the psychiatric unit who are stable, because he cannot find them an assisted living residence for two reasons:

1) because they have Maine Care as their payer, and 2) because they are taking a psychiatric medication. He believes that with our States demographic of aging that we want an assisted living facility in our Town that is assessable to everyone, not just wealthy people. The facilities that "cherry pick" the wealthy as their patients are doing very well and do not need a tax break. The residences that accept Medicaid would benefit from some kind of tax break, and he would be completely supportive of that, because the Medicaid payments are lower. He wants the Council to consider this.

Town Manager Shane said that we amended our ordinance a little over a year ago to require that residential care facilities with more than 20 beds would be required to have 10% or 20% be for Maine Care type patients. This facility is much less than 20 beds. We are trying to attract the larger facilities, but that has proven difficult.

Chairman Turner closed the Public Hearing.

Councilor Bingham made the following motion. Councilor Stiles seconded:

Ordered that the Town, acting pursuant to the provisions of Title 30-A, Chapter 206 of the Maine Revised Statutes, hereby adopts the Second Amendment to the Town of Cumberland TIF #1, Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing Development Program (the "Second Amendment") as presented to this meeting and as has been on file in the Town Clerk's Office, a copy of which is incorporated herein and made a part of the minutes of this meeting. The Town Manager, acting singly, is hereby authorized and directed, on behalf of the Town of Cumberland to execute and submit to the Commissioner of the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development ("DECD") such applications and further documentation as may be necessary or appropriate for any necessary final approval of the Second Amendment; and the Town Manager be, and hereby is, authorized and empowered, at his discretion, from

time to time, to make such technical revisions to the Second Amendment as he deems reasonably necessary or convenient in order to facilitate the process for review and approval of the Second Amendment by the Commissioner of DECD, so long as such revisions are not inconsistent with the Second Amendment or the basic structure and intent of the District or the Second Amendment.

Ordered further that the Town Manager, acting singly, be and hereby is authorized and directed to enter into the Credit Enhancement Agreement as contemplated by the Second Amendment to the Development Agreement, and in the name of and on behalf of the Town, such agreement to be in such form and to contain such terms and provisions, not inconsistent with the Development Program, as amended by the Second Amendment, as the said Town Manager may approve, the Town Manager's approval to be conclusively evidenced by his execution thereof.

VOTE: 5-2 (Gruber and Storey-King opposed) MOTION PASSES

Councilor Gruber said that Dr. Campbell's comments are accurate he feels awful that we did not have this discussion much earlier. He made some calls and found out that this facility was "going to be very pricey". He wishes that he had thought of this himself much earlier. This is why he did not support this.

Councilor Stiles said the more of these types of facilities that are around, the better off we will all be. It would force the pricing to become more reasonable.

Motion by Councilor Bingham, seconded by Councilor Gruber, to refer to the Ordinance Committee review of the current Fireworks Ordinance and report back to the Town Council any recommended amendments.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

Councilor Bingham – Town Manager Shane is very, very good at keeping the Council informed of everything. The Councilor's also spend a lot of time at Town Hall and have the opportunity to observe employees at work and have a pretty good idea of what the needs are. The budgets come before the Council in great detail, including employees and their salaries. Eliza Porter's position was brought to the Council in February and we were all enthused to be "growing our own people".

Councilor Gruber – he has heard from a lot of senior residents who are grateful for the drop off area at the Broad Cove Reserve.

The Town Manager's father came to volunteer at the food pantry last week while visiting from Florida. Thank you to Sid Shane.

He is concerned about the Middle and Tuttle Road intersection. There have been many accidents there and he requested accident data from the Town Manager at a future meeting.

The Lands & Conservation Commission does great work. The Yarmouth Rotary donated benches that the Public Works Department put in the Town Forest. They are wonderful!

He thanked Councilor Edes for going to Dallas and representing the Town.

Councilor Storey-King – she requested a list of people who have received money for the Senior Tax Assistance Program in the past so calls can be made to friends and neighbors to remind them about the program.

The Ordinance Committee has been meeting every other week working on the sign ordinance and working on codifying a process for future Contract Zone Agreements. Both are moving along nicely and the work is thoughtful and intentional.

She has accepted a position as JV Field Hockey Coach, which may cause her to miss a meeting or two in the fall.

Councilor Edes – he attended a dinner party recently on Spruce Lane and heard a lot of compliments about the Brown Tail Moth spraying program. They said that they could really notice a difference where the spraying took place and where it did not. Kudos to the Town for spraying.

Thank you to Councilor Bingham for being the Council Chairman over the last year. He did a great job.

Chairman Turner – July 18th will kick off the Summer Concert Series on the lawn of Greely High School where the Community Band will play.

Congratulations to our Town Manager on his good judgement hiring Eliza Porter. He has hired people for significant positions who have spent time interning and getting the experience to do a good job. He feels that most of the Council joins him in feeling that his good judgement for the appointment of Eliza continues.

Councilor Stiles – If we look back at the promotions of some of other Town employees, you will find, for example, that Chris Bolduc and former Police Chief Charron are two examples of promoting from within.

The Val Halla Board of Trustees met recently. It appears that there are more peopling playing golf and the junior program numbers are also up.

The Central Fire Station building committee met earlier this evening. They got to look at the proposed building site. The committee is making a lot of good progress.

His efforts continue to collect for the 4-H auction to benefit the food pantry. He thanked Councilor Copp for his donations at every Council meeting, as well as Dale Denno for his generous donation.

Councilor Copp – he also supports the hiring of Eliza Porter. We could not have hired a better person. Eliza has worked for the Town for many years and knows how Town government works.

In his experience, most of the accidents that occur at Middle and Tuttle Road do not involve Cumberland residents. The problem is with people that are not familiar with the intersection.

The next Council meeting with be at the West Cumberland Hall.

Town Manager Shane – in regard to the article in the Press Herald regarding the hiring of Eliza Porter, he discussed offering Eliza a job with his administration team. Before we began looking for a Deputy Town Clerk, he wanted to think about working with Eliza for the Deputy Town Clerk/Communications Director position because of her 3 years of experience with the Town. We have always gone internally for candidates and will continue to do so because it is the right thing to do. Eliza finished first in her class at the University of Maine. He feels badly for Eliza that this became front page news and something positive became something negative.
