
MISSION STATEMENT:

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT HELP NEEDED:



ACQUISITIONS:

Merry Chapin send a packet of several items, including a photo of Caroline Blanchard, daughter of Beza, who lived at 16 Blanchard Road. That's the house across the street from the old Sweetser Apple Barrel home. Lots of history in that area! Not much information is available about this mysterious lady except when she was born and the fact that Capt. Beza Blanchard and wife were her parents. If any of you genealogists have information about her, please share it! Thanks.



Deputy Fire Chief Chris Copp donated a conductor's hat badge (#24) from the Portland to Lewiston Interurban. What a treasure that is! Quick research about this badge number does not reveal who Concuctor # 24 was, but we will keep digging.



The Portland-Lewiston part of the Interurban was chartered in 1907 and was out under construction early in 1910. Construction from the Lewiston end began at Littlefield's Corner in Auburn, and the following year the Portland end was started. All work was done by pick and shovel, and horse-drawn dump carts and earth scoops were the tools of the day. An electric locomotive was acquired as soon as rail had been installed, and gravel from the Morrison's Hill pit in West Cumberland was hauled along the line to be used as ballast. The bridge in West Cumberland crossing a stream can still be seen from Route 100, just north of J Brothers' on the other side of the road. The water runs very deep under this bridge, and is a favorite fishing hole. The trolley station for the area was located in behind where Budd's gas station now stands. It has been beautifully restored is now located at the Seashore Trolley Museum in Kennebunk.

ANSWER TO THE JANUARY STUMPER:



28th President of the United States In office March 4, 1913 to March 4, 1921

Thomas Woodrow Wilson (December 28, 1856 – February 3, 1924) was an American politician and academic who served as the 28th President of the United States from 1913 to 1921. Born in Staunton, Virginia, he spent his early years in Augusta, Georgia and Columbia, South Carolina. Wilson earned a PhD in political science at Johns Hopkins University, and served as a professor and scholar at various institutions before being selected as President of Princeton University, a position he held from 1902 to 1910. In 1910, he was the New Jersey Democratic Party's gubernatorial candidate and was elected the 34th Governor of New Jersey, serving from 1911 to 1913. In the 1912 presidential election, Wilson benefited from a split in the Republican Party to win the presidency, gaining a large majority in the Electoral College and a 42% plurality of the popular vote in a four–candidate field. He was the first Southerner elected as president since Zachary Taylor in 1848.Wilson was a leading force in the Progressive Movement, bolstered by his Democratic Party's winning control of both the White House and Congress in 1912.
