ACQUISITIONS:

Claire Vining donated a copy of the Allen family members buried in the little private cemetery on Winn Road just at the Cumberland/Falmouth town line.

Falmouth resident, Jim Milan, stopped in at CHS recently with an interesting artifact that he had dug up from the end of the Felt's Falls Brook. It was a large shard of ancient pottery. We all knew that it was pottery, but the circumference was much too wide, and the inside was too coarse for it to be a kitchen type of bowl Thinking that Thomas Bennett, Director of Prince Memorial Library, might know, it was transported it to him for evaluation. He figured that it was a piece culvert, and, then, the light dawned on us! Probably it was part of the sluice way from the Felt's mill that was in the middle of the stream coming down from Route 88. We felt quite smart coming up with that! Jim also sat down with our box of fossils and Indian artifacts, and helped identify most of them. That was a very productive visit.

COMING UP: Six second grade classes will be doing historical tours throughout the month of May. The second and fourth Saturdays will be open for visitors from 9:00 to 1:00, and there will an Open House before and after the Memorial Day Parade. We will open at 9:00. With all these things going on at our dear little schoolhouse, there will be no program this month. Join us in June for the election of officers and a program on June 15th. The membership meeting will be at 6:30 that evening with the program, to be announced, will follow. The slate of officers is at the end of the newsletter. There are also some items that need to be voted on. They are listed at the end, too.

In doing some research at the request of Eliza Porter, Communications Director at the Town Office, and Fire Chief Dan Small, who coordinates the parade, we discovered that this has been an event in the Town for about 90 years. Join the crowds on Main Street, visit some of the organizations, Cumberland Historical Society included, that have yard sales and food sales, and

meet up with friends and neighbors while viewing the parade. The school bands, flag bearers, and scout groups put on quite the display.

MEMORIAL DAY IN CUMBERLAND: In the looking for when Memorial Day Parades might have started: the first mention of a Memorial Day celebration was in the 1926 Town Report for the year ending February 7, 1927: Article#55 states" To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Memorial Day services." No mention of any services or celebrations was cited before that.

ANSWER TO THE MAY STUMPER: Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. Over two dozen cities and towns claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day. Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear – Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now observed in almost every state on the last Monday in May with Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971 (P.L. 90 – 363). This helped ensure a three day weekend for Federal holidays, though several southern states have an additional separate day for honoring the Confederate war dead: January 19th in Texas; April 26th in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, and Mississippi; May 10th in South Carolina; and June 3rd (Jefferson Davis' birthday) in Louisiana and Tennessee.







In 1915, inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields," Moina Michael replied with her own poem:

We cherish too, the Poppy red That grows on fields where valor led, It seems to signal to the skies That blood of heroes never dies.

She then conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial Day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Later a Madam Guerin from France was visiting the United States and learned of this new custom started by Ms. Michael. When she returned to France she made artificial red poppies to raise money for war orphaned children and widowed women. This tradition spread to other countries. In 1921, the Franco-American Children's League sold poppies nationally to benefit war orphans of France and Belgium. The League disbanded a year later and Madam Guerin approached the VFW for help.

Shortly before Memorial Day in 1922 the VFW became the first veterans' organization to nationally sell poppies. Two years later their "Buddy" Poppy program was selling artificial poppies made by disabled veterans. In 1948 the US Post Office honored Ms. Michael for her role in founding the National Poppy movement by issuing a red 3 cent postage stamp with her likeness on it.

National Moment of Remembrance: The "National Moment of Remembrance" resolution was passed on Dec 2000 which asks that at 3 p.m. local time, for all Americans "To voluntarily and informally observe in their own way a Moment of remembrance and respect, pausing from whatever they are doing for a moment of silence or listening to '<u>Taps</u>.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT CHS?: Lots of work is getting done on Monday mornings. We have been sorting, accessioning, cleaning, photographing items in our collection, and clipping Cumberland related items from newspapers, among other things. We have had two visits from a structural engineer, Al Hodsdon, for his evaluation of the physical needs of the schoolhouse. He was hired by the Town of Cumberland, and has done a very thorough job. There are some issues for our dear old building, but nothing that can't be fixed. Preparations are being made for things coming up; the SCAVENGER HUNT on May 19th, Memorial Day Open House on May 29th, May visits from the Mabel I. Wilson School 2nd grades for their historical walks, two scheduled historic bus tours on June 20th and June 27th through Cumberland Rec. Department, and the second and fourth Saturdays of the month open doors for visitors. And now, thanks to Eliza Porter at the Town Office, and member Margie Gruber we have a link to the Town of Cumberland website. Check it out. They have worked hard to get this set up, and it will help open us up to the world. Scholarship applications have been turned over to the scholarship committee, and they are reviewing all 15 to present to Greely High School. And, last, but not least, our gardener, Sandy Nickerson has spent several hours already raking up the front two little yards, fixing up the window box and front doors with spring bouquets, and tidying up the front gardens. We are looking good!
