## What is an opioid?



## Opioids

• "Substances, both natural and synthetic, that bind to the opioid receptors in the body's nervous system."



## Opioids



 Reduce perception of pain

•Depress the central nervous

system

 Induce euphoria

## Opioids

- Natural (aka "Opiates") derived from opium poppies
   Morphine
  - Codeine
  - Thebaine
- Semi-Synthetic derived from opiates
  - HeroinOxycodone
  - Buprenorphine
- Synthetic
- Methadone
- Fentanyl
- Carfentanil

## Heroin



- Processed from morphine (a natural opiate extracted from poppy plants)
- First synthesized in 1874
- Marketed by German pharmaceutical Bayer from 1898 to 1910 as a cough suppressant and morphine substitute

## Heroin

Usually one-tenth of a grar in a tiny envelope

10 envelopes together is a bundle Powder inside ranging from white to brown



### Heroin


Can be injected

Can be smoked

Can be snorted



## Why heroin? Why now?



- In 1996, Oxycontin (a powerful narcotic painkiller and derivative of opium) was introduced
- Prescription rates skyrocketed
- People became dependent
- Unable to find / afford Oxycontin, turned to heroin

## Signs of opiate abuse:

- Presence of
  - paraphernalia for use:
  - Needles
  - Baggies
  - Spoons
  - Cut straws or pen barrels (used for snorting)
  - Glass pipes

- Mood changes
  - Anxiety
  - Euphoria

## Signs of opioid abuse, cont.

- Physical symptoms
  - Increased sensitivity to sensory stimuli
  - Decreased appetite
  - Increased energy

## Effects of Opioid Abuse

- Drowsiness / Fatigue
- Sense of elation
- Nausea / Vomiting
- Depressed respiration
- Death

## Naloxone = Narcan<sup>™</sup>

### Naloxone HCL

Naloxone <u>temporarily</u> displaces and blocks opioids from receptors in the body.

### Naloxone HCL

- Opioid antagonist
- Short duration of effect
- No serious side-effects, even if patient is not on opioids
  - Easy to administer

## Narcan (naloxone)



- Narcan is only a piece of the rescue effort
- CPR and / or rescue breathing may be necessary
- Effects are temporary additional doses may be necessary
- The person may wake up suddenly, be disoriented, and / or combative

## The newest threats:

- Fentanyl:
  - A potent synthetic opioid pain medication
  - Frequently used for palliative care (treatment of serious illness and pain)
  - Extremely powerful and often prescribed (1700 kilograms used globally in 2013)



### The newest threats:



### Carfentanil:

- A synthetic opioid
- Used as a large animal anesthetic
- The most potent commercially used opioid (100x stronger than fentanyl)
- Experts suspect it's use by the Russian military during the 2002 Moscow theater hostage crisis





## Where do we go from here?

- Be prepared to encounter these dangerous substances and treat individuals who have overdosed.
- Remain vigilant to the likelihood that these substances are in our community, being transported on our roadways.
- Work with our partners in the law enforcement, treatment and education professions to combat the problem.
- Remain open minded and understand it is unlikely we will "arrest our way out of this problem."



#### 16 - 130To consider and act on adoption of trail logos as recommended by the Lands & Conservation Commission.
